## Waged poverty in Australia



A waged poor household is one living below the poverty line, whose main source of household income is wages and salaries



Waged poor households make-up **nearly** a **quarter** of all households in poverty and 3.2% of all Australian households

Just **over half** also receive some form of income support

They tend to be **larger than other households in poverty** (average 2.7 compared to 1.9 people)

**74%** have just one person employed

## **CHARACTERISTICS**





**Nearly half** of all waged poor households include children



**35%** of waged poor households are couples with children

while only 10% of other households in poverty are couples with children



65% of waged poor households are renting, more than double the rate of renting in the general population



Waged poor households are nearly **twice as likely** to experience difficulties paying gas, electricity or telephone bills as the general population



The key issue is not poor household budgeting, it is lack of income





The salary earner often works irregular hours and lacks workplace entitlements like sick leave and annual leave, as well as being ineligible for some income supports and concessions



Only 1% of waged poor households

seek help from welfare or community organisations - less than the rate of the general population, and more than ten times less than other households in poverty
